#### **Speaker Bio:**

Daniel Pipes is director of the Middle East Forum and a prize-winning columnist for the *New York Sun* and *The Jerusalem Post*. His most recent book, *Miniatures: Views of Islamic and Middle Eastern Politics* appeared in late 2003. Dr. Pipes received his A.B. (1971) and Ph.D. (1978) from Harvard University, both in history. He spent six years studying abroad, including three years in Egypt. Mr. Pipes speaks French, and reads Arabic and German. He has taught at the University of Chicago, Harvard University, and the U.S. Naval War College. He has served in various capacities in the U.S. government, including two President-appointed positions, vice chairman of the Fulbright Board of Foreign Scholarships and member of the board of the U.S. Institute of Peace. He was director of the Foreign Policy Research Institute, 1986-93.
