Synopsis: On April 18, President Bush threatened to impose tougher sanctions on the Khartoum government if it does not act to end the violence in Darfur. Once again, Khartoum has been allowed to buy time. In the four years since the crisis began, millions have lost their homes and their livelihoods; hundreds of thousands have lost their lives. The ENOUGH Campaign has released a comprehensive strategy for Darfur that promotes movement on three critical fronts: promoting peace; protecting civilians; and punishing the perpetrators. Only when the United States moves on all three fronts can we hope to see an end to the suffering in Darfur, the promise of justice for her people, and an end to the cycle of impunity. Anita Sharma will discuss the ENOUGH campaign and how it proposes to bring about an end to some of the world's worst humanitarian crises in Darfur, Eastern Congo and Northern Uganda.

Speaker Bio: Anita Sharma is the Executive Director of ENOUGH, a new initiative of the Center for American Progress and the International Crisis Group to abolish genocide and mass atrocities. She most recently served as governance advisor in Indonesia with the Office of the United Nations Recovery Coordinator and has held international posts in Indonesia, Iraq, Jordan, and Kosovo with the International Organization for Migration (IOM), the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE), and the Council of Europe. In the United States, she directed the Conflict Prevention Project at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars and has also worked as the research director for the Role of American Military Power Project and the Carnegie Commission on Preventing Deadly Conflict. She is a term member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and holds a bachelor's degree with honors from Syracuse University and a master's degree from the School of International and Public Affairs at Columbia University.
